Koolen-de Vries Syndrome

KdVS can affect many different body systems. Look out for and consider referrals to specialists for the following:

Ophthalmology:
hypermetropia, myopia,
strabismus, congenital
cataract, and optic atrophy

Speech and Language
Delay: childhood apraxia of
speech, expressive and/or
receptive speech delay

ENT: recurrent ear infections, hearing impairment, stridor, laryngeomalacia, tracheomalacia, GERD

Genitourinary differences:
Cryptorchidism,
hypospadias,
hydronephrosis/VUR, renal
duplication

Brain Structural differences: ventriculomegaly, corpus callosum anomalies, Arnold-Chiari type I malformation

Seizures: 50% of individuals with KdVS have epilepsy; ESES may also be seen

Congenital heart defects may be present including: VSD, ASD, bicuspid aortic valve, cardiomyopathy, aortic root dilatation

Musculoskeletal: scoliosis, joint laxity, flat feet, hip dysplasia

Hypotonia: feeding difficulties, motor delay

Endocrine:
hypothyroidism and
neutropenia, Addison's
disease
